Welcome back to school! We hope that you have had a good half-term break. Over the next two termlets, our Creative Curriculum will focus on the changes in Britain from the Stone Age to the Iron Age. This termlet (from now until the Christmas holiday) will focus specifically on the Stone Age.

Some of our activities will involve:-

- Using the internet and non-fiction books for research.
- Presenting information in a variety of ways.
- Learning how archaeologists find out about the past.
- Reading 'Stig of the Dump' by Clive King as a class book
- Considering who were the first people to live in Britain, what their lives were like and how they survived
- Learn about the course of events that might have led Stone-Age people to move from hunting and gathering to farming.
- Finding out about the Mesolithic settlement Star Carr, in Yorkshire and role-play a day in the life of the Star Carr people.
- Finding out about the Neolithic village of Skara Brae in Orkney, Scotland and how it is important for helping us to understand life in the Stone Age,
- Finding out about the different ways Stone Age people created paints and colours and experiment with a variety of techniques. Research the cave paintings that have been discovered in France and create their own cave painting. Building a cave and decorating it with cave art.
- Researching the meaning and significance of Stonehenge.

Your child would benefit from your support—please get involved:-

- Take your child to the library to get a book about the topic
- Supervise internet research for homework activities
- Collect shells, sticks, straws and feathers –send to school for cave painting activities.
- Watch history programmes (Horrible Histories are good for that!).
- Help your child with their Creative Curriculum project homework (information sent home on 24/10/19) which is due in on 25/11/19

Physical Education

The children have **PE** on **Tuesdays** and **Fridays**. Tuesday's lesson will is taught by our sports coach, Mr Wotmough, from Swift Sports.
