## Ethos

At Rangeworthy CE VC Primary School, we have an agreed school uniform, which is made clear to families on our website. We believe that uniform fosters a sense of identity and belonging, promotes the ethos of the school and sets a tone for the academic and educational expectations of the school.

## Policy

At Rangeworthy Primary School we have agreed to follow the non-statutory government guidance and to have a uniform policy. This policy outlines the expectations around appearance and the fair approach we take to managing the sourcing and funding of uniforms.

The expectations around uniform are as follows;
All children are expected to wear school uniform as it helps create a sense of identity and belonging to our school. With our behaviour management, we are adopting a 'This is how we do it here,' approach which we extend this to our school uniform. In September, we request that all children show they are 'ready' to be part of our Rangeworthy School community by wearing the correct uniform.
Our expectations are as follows:

- A red or white blouse, shirt or polo shirt
- Plain smart skirt or pinafore in grey or black
- Grey or red tights
- Trousers or tailored shorts in grey or black
- In summer, there is an option to wear a red checked/striped dress
- Red jumper, cardigan or sweatshirt, either with school logo or without. The Y6 children have an option of wearing a 'Leavers' hoodie (this is organised by a parent).
- Socks should be white, grey, red or black in colour


## Jewellery and Hair Accessories:

Physical activity is something the children will participate in on a daily basis therefore we kindly ask that earrings are not worn at all in school for the children's safety. However, if earrings are worn to school, they must be small studs and must be removed by your child for PE as we cannot put tape over the top. Also, it is essential that long hair, shoulder length or longer, should be tied back using a plain black, hair-colour or school uniform colour. Bows and other accessories are not permitted.

## PE Kit

- Black plain shorts or skorts (no leggings)
- Plain grey, red or black fleece, hoodie or sweatshirt for outdoor lessons on cooler days
- Plain, round-neck, house colour T-shirt (Blue, Yellow or Red dependent on House colour). A plain white round necked T-shirt can also be worn as this may be cheaper and easier to purchase
- Trainers for indoor/outdoor games if your child wears school shoes (see note below regarding footwear)
- Plain jogging bottoms
- PE kit should be worn to school on your child's PE day and Sports Day or if they are attending an after school sports club.


## Footwear:

Footwear is often the area we are asked most about at school. We aim to make footwear as straight forward as possible. Our children are more active in school than they have ever been, therefore we are now changing our shoe policy to include wearing trainers that fit specific criteria:

## - Black

*For any child who is unable to tie laces, strongly consider Velcro for safety. Smart school shoes are still welcome and perfectly acceptable; however, your child may wish to ensure they have something more appropriate in their bag for active parts of their day although this would mean your child would need two pairs of shoes for school as opposed to one.

Thank you for your support in helping to support our children to belong to, and feel proud of, our Rangeworthy community.

## Laws to consider when applying the uniform policy:

The Governing Body of Rangeworthy Primary ensures that in developing a uniform policy, it complies with the Human Rights Act of 1998 and Equality Act of 2010, as well as the Safeguarding and Health and Safety Requirements set out in additional policies.

## Supply

The school suppliers are Monkhouse Schoolwear, which specialises in providing uniform at reasonable cost to local schools. The uniform is comfortable and practical.
However, parents are welcome to source uniforms from any shop as this may be more cost effective, provided the colours match those in our expectations. The uniform is suitable for travel to and from school. During hotter months, children can wear shorts or summer dresses. During cold weather, children are encouraged to wear layers. The children may also wear warmer footwear such as boots (black only) in colder weather. We are mindful of the equality act and open to engaging in conversations around diversity, should they present themselves, as this is an ongoing part of our ethos.

## Recycling and Reusing

Over the year, we build up a stock of used uniforms in all sizes and these are available to any child who loses an item of uniform and to support our families who
require replacements due to circumstances. A 'swap shop' approach is also supported by our School Association. We wash and store the uniforms. Where families, disadvantaged or not, require a hand with items of uniform, they are supported in a sensible and discrete way. We also feel our approach is kinder to the environment and reduces waste.

## Human Rights, Equality and Discrimination Consideration

As a school, we support equality and in implementing this policy will consider children with protected characteristics, including sex, religion, belief, race, disability and gender reassignment. We feel uniform helps our pupils feel part of the school identity, but that feeling included in a way which is equal and non-discriminatory is paramount.

## Religion and Beliefs

The school will always be sensitive to the needs of different cultures, races and religions and will act reasonably in accommodating these, without compromising safety or discipline within the school. We believe any concerns in this regard can be addressed through dialogue and understanding.

## Flexibility and Non-Discrimination

Children will not be discriminated against, in terms of uniform expectations, based on cost or availability (eg a boy and a girl should have the same expectations in terms of cost and availability). Children with protected characteristics will not be discriminated against. Individual needs and requirements will be addressed on an individual basis, through dialogue, reasonable adjustments and fair decision making, in a discrete and thoughtful way.

## Complaints and Disputes over Uniform

Where there is a complaint about the school's approach or policy on school uniform, the complaint procedure, as is published on the website, should be followed. Concerns and complaints can be made with ease and the school will work with parents to find an acceptable outcome. Any concerns over the quality of uniform from the agreed supplier, will result in direct dialogue with the supplier, should these concerns be justified. Uniform is inclusive and where there are concerns around pupils with protected characteristics, these will be considered carefully by the Headteacher and Governing Body in a discrete and fair way.

## Non-Compliance

Where there are serious breaches of the school policy which are not based on fair or reasonable factors or concerns, the school will follow the behaviour policy in a fair and proportionate way and no pupil will be penalised for decisions beyond their control.
